Statement by H.E. Peter Thomson Peace Bell Ceremony Commemorating the International Day of Peace

Excellencies, Mr. Secretary-General Ambassador Bessho of Japan, Under Secretary General Gallach, Messengers of Peace and Goodwill Ambassador, Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is a great honor to join you today to commemorate the International Day of Peace.

Standing here in this hallowed space, we are reminded of the origins of the UN - an institution born from the ashes of World War II, as a beacon of hope to bring lasting peace to a traumatized world.

As the Peace Bell sounds today, we listen to its reverberations spread around the United Nations. These vibrations carry across the globe to the world's trouble spots where we pray, they are felt by all those seeking signs of hope.

I close with the words of Eleanor Roosevelt when she said "It isn't enough to talk about peace, one must believe in it. And it isn't enough to believe in it, one must work at it."

At this commencement of the 71st session, let us all go to work on the achievement of universal peace.
